Bound for Brazil

Stages along the way:

The story of why I made the trip to Brazil has a long pre-history. It began way back at the turn of the millennium when Dean Drayton, William Emilsen and myself set up (what we think what was) the first Masters of Public Theology in the world. That was at UTC where we would be greatly assisted in UTC where we would be greatly assisted in our endeavours by Moira Bryant as the Library Manager. That was the first step: the second step was a walk down the Royal Mile in Edinburgh in the company of two other scholars - William Storrar (then of Edinburgh, now of Princeton) and Nico Koopman (Stellenbosch University, South Africa. We discovered we had much in common and Will began the process of putting into and Will began the process of putting into place a process that would lead to the formation of the Global Network of Public

Today there are over 50 institutions around the world that belong to this Network which has a conference every three years. The Network has also established through a major Dutch publishing an International Journal of Public Theology. That was the brainchild of Sebastian Kim (now of Fuller Theological Seminary in Pasadena, USA). I have been its editor-in-chief for the past five years. In the past I have been the deputy chair of the network as well been on the executive for all but a couple of years

So what is public theology?

Theology has to do with how we understand our faith in God. It explores our understanding of God, creation, what it means to be human, how we understand the person and work of Christ as well as how we understand the Holy Spirit, the purpose of the church (including worship): it examines what we think is the Christian life and what it means to be a disciple, how we engage in mission and what do Christians hope for.

The most obvious audience for this work is the church. It is the Christian faith reflecting on its beliefs and experiences. It is also an area of knowledge that has a long academic history. Theology used to be called 'the queen of sciences' - and, up until relatively recently, the churches assumed that it was always important for them to think hard and deeply about belief.

There is a third audience, though - that

is, the public domain. How does the Christian faith contribute with society at large to build up a sense of the common good, a civil society. This public domain can be divided up into a number of spheres: i) government / law; ii). economics and labour; iii). religions, NGOs and voluntary societies; iv) media and artists; and v). social media.

In order to play a part in these spheres a public theology needs to win the right to be heard, to be persuasive rather than dogmatic, to engage with other disciplines and fields of knowledge and ensure that the most vulnerable are heard. It seeks to

nurture a civil discourse - and it must be willing to respond, in faith and Christian thought, to issues that arise and threaten society. Examples of such issues are climate change, the life of cities, asylum-seeking, terrorism - and many others.

Curitiba in the state of Parana.

The 6th conference of the Network was held in Parana, about an hour by plane to the south of the huge megacity, Sao Paulo, in Brazil. It was a long flight to get there -Auckland, Santiago, Sao Paulo and Curitiba and even longer to get home. There were 150 folk present (on-line and on-site) from around the world.

Curitiba is a city of around 2 million people. It was developed as a garden city and so there are a number of green spaces (which is not always the case in Brazilian cities). The university where we gathered was a private Catholic university of 30,000 students. The campus was well laid out. It has a chapel which is open all the time: around the walls are scenes taken from the stages of the cross. The windows feature modern, colourful artistic swirling designs that capture the energy of the Spirit.

The university works closely with congregations and agencies in the provision of relief the poor (of which there are many

in Brazil). I took part in an orientation at the beginning of the conference to a Francis and Clare House (named after the 2 13th century saints who cared for the poor). This is a university initiative providing shelter, work, food for those at a disadvantage; another place made available food packages for the needy on the back of the price of rice having risen 6 fold due to inflation.

The city has the only holocaust museum in Brazil. Quite a number of Jews fled Nazi Germany for Brazil. The Curitiba museum is understated. Some holocaust museums have large piles of shoes – this one only 3 shoes but with an accompanying audio telling the story behind these shoes.

There are many restaurants and cafes - but no flat whites. Cappuccinos are not the Brazilian versions include some chocolate. It seems as if everyone is a carnivore and there are so many different types of meat circulating in restaurants as you eat as much as you like for a set price. I surrendered early and concentrated on salads - one of my table companions declared that he was 'allergic to anything green' as he commented on how 'delicious' his meat portions were. Bound for Brazil Cont'd...

At the conference dinner I was part of a panel that reflected on the past 15 years of the Network. This dinner was held in a restaurant called 'The Stage of Five Senses'. It was set up by an artist who also built a stage for his wife, a violinist, who played with a pianist between courses works of Brazilian composers.

The theme

The theme for this consultation had to do with faith in the cities. There is not a lot of urban theology in Australia. That is to our loss. I chaired a group on Liveable Cities and presented a paper on faith, being a designated highly placed liveable city finding itself having to deal with Covid, fires, extreme heat and floods. In other words, I was reflecting theologically on life in Sydney.

There were several key note addresses. One was from a Sudanese woman, a professor of architecture who spoke on development and the use of space – and how the decision not to build is also an architectural decision. A second address was from a leading Orthodox theologian, Cyril Hovorun, from Ukraine: he had once worked closely with the patriarch of the Russian Orthodox Church but left Moscow when the Russians invaded Crimea. The patriarch has blessed Russia's war as a holy war against the decadent west much to Hovorun's disgust.

The last keynote was very different. It was an artistic performance from a Latin American theologian who happens to be a professional clown! His presentation had to do with climate change and the threat to the

forests - the fate of the Amazon jungle was strongly implied. He dressed himself up as 'the spirit of the forest': his 'costume' was one of green leaves, a tee-shirt that captured flames and his hair was a flame-like orange as well. His performance was stunning: I have attended a never conference where theologian was called back on stage for a curtain call!





What next?

The next GNPT conference will be held in 2025 in Pasadena, California. By that time I will have stepped down from the editorship of the journal but continue to assist as a language editor. So many articles (58 out of 97 contributions since 2019) have come from people whose first language is not English.

In the meantime Brazil anxiously await the decision of its election. Will it continue with far-right Bolsonaro or swing back to the left with Lula?

Advent Studies for this year

The coming Season of Avent in the Christian calendar commences on Sunday 27th November. We traverse from a gospel year in Luke into a year featuring Matthew.

This means that we move from a year featuring gentiles and the needy to a focus on Jewish people, the chosen people of God as viewed by Matthew.

We will be engaged in Three studies this advent, at weekly intervals.

The first will be led by Clive Pearson who will provide us with much food for thought. He will draw comparisons between the Advent story of Christmas as presented by both Matthew and Luke and provide some clues about what will follow in Matthew as we explore this Gospel in 2023.

Drawing on the information provided by Clive, the following two weeks of the study will be led by Michael Strong and will first involve reflections on the events leading up to the birth of Jesus. The second will consider the entry of Herod and horrid actions he inflicted on male children in Bethlehem and the flight of Jesus and his family to Egypt. This exploration will continue through to the exchanges between John the Baptist and Jesus.

<u>Updates from St. Matthew's Finance Committee</u>:

It was great to catch up with members of the Church groups and committees in June this year to determine the budgets that each required for our current 2022/23 financial year.

As a church family it is necessary that we 'live within our means' just as we do for own family budget. As Dom explained at the AGM in July, we expect to run a deficit budget again in 2022/23, so keeping expenses under control is essential.

In order to keep our church expenses under control, groups and committees need to advise either Barry Gregory or Alastair Burn of all purchases prior to the money being expended. If a group or committee has already used its yearly budget, the requested purchase may need to be deferred to the following financial year or an alternate method of funding may need to be found.

It is important that all potential expenditure is approved prior to the payment of invoices:

For expenditure under \$1000 that was included in the current Church budget, please contact Alastair or Barry to ensure that the proposed expenditure will be within the allocated budget amount (so that it does **not exceed** the allocated amount) and then the purchase can be forwarded to Barry for processing.

For expenditure over \$1000 or expenditure that is <u>not</u> included in the Church budget, please complete the new 'Expense Approval Request Form' and forward to Alastair for approval <u>prior</u> to the expense being incurred.
