Advent is often described as the season of waiting. We wait expectantly for the remembrance of Christmas and the celebration of Christ, Immanuel – God with us. We wait in the sense of making space for God in our lives. This is the first season of the Church liturgical year, so it is important to start as we intend to continue and finish. We also wait for the coming of Christ anew into our lives, both as a community and as individuals, but there is also the eschatological sense (which is a big word for the end of all things and God bringing to completion God's work) where we are waiting for the return of the Christ. Finally, there is the sense of hopeful waiting. In a world with so many issues which result in hardship and suffering for so many, we are hopefully waiting for these to be resolved.

Here is a nice piece about Advent and waiting from Ignatian spirituality. However, Advent isn't really about waiting.

Advent comes from the Latin word 'adventus' which apparently means coming or arrival. So, yes there is the sense that we are waiting for the coming of Christ, both in the Nativity narrative and in the sense of the return of Christ. Yet, advent in English also refers to the fact of an event happening, an invention being made, or a person arriving. God has come in the person of Jesus. That has happened. We are not waiting for that, and we shouldn't be waiting to celebrate it. There can be a lot of anticipatory waiting ahead of Christmas, but that isn't the point of waiting. The liturgical seasons give us work to do. After all, the word liturgy comes from the Greek word $\lambda eirovoria$ (leitourgia) which literally has as its roots the meaning of the work of the people. Advent gives us the not only the work of preparation for the celebration of the coming of God as the Messiah, but the work of being ready by doing what we know is right and good as we follow in the way of the Christ.

Over the last month or so, we have had in the Revised Common Lectionary a whole series of Gospel readings about being ready. Advent, being the first season of the liturgical year is about remembering that God, in the person of Chris, is already present and at work. The Kingdom of God isn't coming in the sense of it is yet to come, but is here and present now and is coming more and more into being as we join with God in God's work of bringing it further and deeper into reality.

So, Advent gives us work to do. The traditions of Advent scaffold us in that work with the key ideas of hope, peace, joy and love. These are not just nice words or nice concepts. Whilst we would like to see more of all of what they hold in the world, the reality is that God is at work, as God has consistently always been at work, to make them a greater reality and to keep undoing the mess we as humans keep making of the world. Yes, we are getting ready to celebrate anew the Advent of Jesus' birth, but it is not just about his birth, but what that signified and what it means for us as we start a new Church year. Advent is about the fact that hope, peace, joy and love are already a part of our existence, but we need to take up the work of bringing them further into our relationship and make them more consistently a part of human being.

So, what are we waiting for? We really should get on and get back to work. The whole reason for the seasons of the liturgical year to keep repeating and cycling through again and again is to keep reminding us about what we should be doing. There is much work to be done. There so much need for hope, and the best way to bring hope is to get down and dirty in caring for others. There is so much need for peace, especially with the prevalence of anxiety, stress and worry and our need to always be busy, but busy in ways which don't seem to result in much satisfaction or wellbeing. There is always a need for joy, for joy makes all things more bearable. It lightens the soul and makes good our living because it is usually rooted in appreciation, gratitude and thanksgiving. Finally, there is love, and the greatest of these is love. God is love and we who live in love live in God and God lives in us. We are called, dare I say commanded, to love, for that is how we honour God and express true worship and there is no greater way to show our love for God than loving our neighbour as ourselves.

Advent gives us a whole lot of work to do. It is good work which is good for the soul. What are we waiting for? Let's keep meeting together and encourage each other to love and good work.





Hi everyone,

There have been eleven funerals this year for people who have connected with the St. Matthews' Community. No doubt there have been other deaths experienced in the families and circles of friends known to you. It was indeed timely that Mary Pearson included a bereavement segment in our June Workshop on Pastoral Caring. In part 2 of the sharing of material from the Workshop there are some thoughts about helping people who are mourning the loss of a loved one. We don't often talk about death and dying and so we have difficulty knowing what to say when friends or family are bereaved. I hope you find the words of some value to you.

Helping the Bereaved

Give:

A good ear Time to really listen A hug when appropriate Continuing contact

What can help bereaved persons:

Contact the person as soon as you hear of the death. Tell them you are sorry to hear of their loss, or send a card or flowers.

Maintain contact personally or by phone, notes , cards. Visits need not be long. LISTEN. Possibly the most important thing you can do.

Accept their behavior i.e. crying, screaming, being quiet, laughing. Allow expressions of anger, guilt and blame.

Offer practical help, such as a cooked meal, taking care of the children, cutting the grass etc. Really try to understand the person. Every person is different. Indicate that grief takes time.

Include children in the grieving process. Be sensitive about dates that might be upsetting or significant for the bereaved person.

What may not be helpful:

Avoiding talking about the person who has died unless the bereaved persons does so. Inhibiting them by offering advice. Stopping contact if the going gets too heavy. Lectures or reasoning. Expecting or judging how it should be. Using cliches. False reassurances. Saying "I know how you feel." Trying to do everything for them. Comparing one loss to another. Describing the theory of grief. Taking the focus away from what they are saying. Equating a loss you have experienced to theirs. Giving details of your grief, unless the person finds this relevant to their situation.

OP Shop News 2023

Dear friends,

It has been an exciting year for the St. Matthew's Op Shop. We have welcomed a few new members of staff, and we continue to recruit more where possible. The Lord has shown His generosity through a great many community donations which have sustained us with our 'garage sales' every month and treasures for the Op Shop. We have continued to support the Ukraine refugee community with donations of clothes and bedding. We also support the foster parents of the 'seeing-eye' puppies as they grow the dogs for the first year of their lives. We are extremely fortunate to have a strong, cohesive team of volunteers who keep the door open every week. I am personally very grateful for the dedication and hard work of everyone of the team.

We not only have the teams that arrive each day of trading, we also have those who work behind the scenes with sorting and



pricing on a Monday, assessing treasures for auction, and cultivating plants for sale. There are people who help with financial spreadsheets, banking, and selling goods on-line to raise extra money. We rely on one particular gentleman to maintain our aging clothes racks and do a myriad of jobs around the shop and dungeon to improve safety and conditions.

Many of the volunteers take work home, sorting and pricing jewellery, washing garments, and making watches work.



Many of these folk are not part of the St. Matthew's congregation, but happily contribute time and energy into helping us. We are also fortunate to have very loyal customers. I would estimate that half of our customers have become friends that we look forward to seeing each week.

On another positive note, David Porter has recently acquired a portable ramp for the Op Shop. This will assist those with mobility problems coming into the Op Shop from the Church foyer.

Our last day of trading for 2023 will be 14th December, and we open again on 30th January 2024.

On behalf of the entire team, we wish everyone a very joyful, safe Christmas, and a very Happy New Year.
